SUBJECT: Adds/Deletes for December 16, 2021, Meeting. Replacing Table 2 of Exhibit 1 in

the South St. Petersburg CRA Budget Resolution for City Council Agenda Item E.3.

Explanation

City Administration is requesting replacement of Table 2 of Exhibit 1 of the South St. Petersburg Community Redevelopment Area (CRA) budget resolution concerning an amendment to the FY22 budget plan. The proposed amendment reallocates \$1.2 million in funding from the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget to the "CRA Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget to increase affordable housing in the CRA. The original Table 2 of Exhibit 1 did not contain the correct total for funding in the "Affordable Residential Incentive Programs", which will increase from \$724,660 to \$1,324,660 if the proposed amendment is approved.

These changes are identified in Attachment 1 which includes the original resolution and original Table 4 along with the revised Table 2.



A RESOLUTION BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ST. PETERSBURG APPROVING AMENDMENTS TO THE FY22 BUDGET PLAN FOR THE SOUTH ST. PETERSBURG REDEVELOPMENT DISTRICT FUND (1104) TO REALLOCATE \$1.2 MILLION IN FUNDING FROM THE "CRA COMMUNICATIONS, OPERATIONS AND EVALUATION" BUDGET TO THE "HOUSING AND NEIGHBORHOOD REVITALIZATION" BUDGET TO INCREASE FUNDING FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN THE SOUTH ST. PETERSBURG COMMUNITY REDEVELOPMENT AREA; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of St. Petersburg City Council approved Resolution No. 2013-247, on June 20, 2013, which made a finding of necessity identifying the South St. Petersburg Community Redevelopment Area (CRA) as blighted, pursuant to Florida's Community Redevelopment Act of 1969 (Chapter 163, Part III) and was delegated authority by the Pinellas County Board of County Commissioners (BCC) on June 9, 2014, in order to carry out certain redevelopment functions within the CRA;

WHEREAS, on November 9, 2021, City Council approved Resolution #2021-566 adopting the FY22 budget of \$13,009,038 million for the South St. Petersburg CRA Redevelopment District Fund;

WHEREAS, the FY22 CRA budget provided \$1,850,660 in funding to the "CRA Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget (see Exhibit 1, Table 2), which included *inter alia* allocations of \$1,126,000 for Single Family Residential Programs and \$724,660 for Affordable Residential Incentive Programs;

WHEREAS, the FY22 CRA budget also provided \$3,345,722 in funding to the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operation" budget (see Exhibit 1, Table 4), which included *inter alia* an allocation of \$1,500,000 for "Deuces/WADA Improvements" along 22nd Street South that entails partially funding a "festival" street between 9th Avenue South and 11th Avenue South;

WHEREAS, as part of its recommended allocations of \$45,413,871 in funding received in summer 2021 from the American Relief Plan Act (ARPA), City Administration included \$1,600,000 for the "Deuces Live Festival Street" from 9th Avenue South to 11th Avenue South;

WHEREAS, at the November 29, 2021, City Council Committee of the Whole (COW) meeting, City Administration presented the proposed ARPA allocations, and the COW indicated support for using ARPA funding for the "Deuces Live Festival Street";

WHEREAS, City Administration desires to increase funding for affordable housing in the South St. Petersburg Community Redevelopment Area, and the availability of ARPA funding to replace CRA funding for the "Deuces/WADA Improvements" would allow the City to increase the "CRA Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget;

WHEREAS, City Administration is recommending that \$1,200,000 be reallocated from the "Deuces/WADA Improvements" in the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget to the "Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget, where it would be allocated in the following manner:

WHEREAS, City Administration presented the proposed amendments to the CRA budget to the Citizen Advisory Committee for the South St. Petersburg CRA (CAC) at its December 7, 2021, meeting where the CAC voted unanimously to recommend approval of City Administration's proposed amended budget to the St. Petersburg Community Redevelopment Agency; and

WHEREAS, at its December 16, 2021, public meeting, the St. Petersburg Community Redevelopment Agency recommended that the St. Petersburg City Council approve City Administration's proposed amendments to the FY22 CRA Budget Plan described above.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the St. Petersburg City Council approves the following amendments to the FY22 South St. Petersburg CRA Budget Plan:

- Reallocating \$1.2 million in CRA funding from the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget to the "CRA Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget;
- 2) Maintaining \$300,000 in the "Deuces/WADA Improvements" line item of the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget;

A resolution by the City Council of the City of St. Petersburg approving an amendment to the FY22 budget plan for the South St. Petersburg Redevelopment District Fund (1104) to reallocate \$1.2 million in funding from the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget to the "CRA Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget to increase funding for affordable housing in the South St. Petersburg Community Redevelopment Area; and providing an effective date.

RECOMMENDATION Administration recommends City Council approve the attached Resolution.

Overview of Recommended Actions on FY22 CRA Budget

City Council APPROVE the following amendments to the FY22 budget plan for the South St. Petersburg CRA Redevelopment District Fund:

- Reallocate \$1.2 million in CRA funding from the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget to the "CRA Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget;
- 2) Maintain \$300,000 in the "Deuces/WADA Improvements" line item of the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget;

Background on the South St. Petersburg CRA Budget Amendment

On November 9, 2021, City Council approved the estimated **\$13.01 million** FY22 South St. Petersburg CRA budget, which included a Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget of **\$1.850 million**, with the understanding that City Administration would be bringing back an amendment package to increase funding for affordable housing.

The proposed amendment is designed to increase funding for affordable housing and moves \$1.2 million of the \$1.5 million in funding from the "CRA Communications, Operations and Evaluation" budget to the "Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget. The funding will be pulled from the "Deuces/WADA Improvements" line item, which includes the installation of a "festival" street from 9th Avenue South to 11th Avenue South. City Administration is proposing to use the City's share of funding from the American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) approved by Congress to pay for the festival street improvements. The remaining \$300,000 for the project in the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget will be used to cover construction cost inflation and engineering design services.

In summer 2021, the City received approximately \$45.4 million in ARPA funding. The City will receive two installments of \$22.71 million, the first disbursed in July with the second to be received in summer 2022. In late July, City Administration held three workshops to identify the priorities of citizens from five broad categories. A total of 557 citizens ranked their priorities with "1" being the highest and "5" being the lowest. Below are the results calculated as a weighted average score.

¹ City Administration is proposing the \$20 million in housing funding be split in the following manner: 1) \$6.5 million for the Deuces Rising housing component; 2) \$3.5 million for homelessness services, including scattered site family shelter and permanent supportive housing services; and 3) \$10 million for future multi-family housing projects for households at 60% AMI and less.

Under "Economic Recovery and Resiliency", City Administration is recommending four transportation and public-realm related projects with a total cost of **\$5,568,830**. This would include **\$1.6 million** for improvements to 22nd St S for the "Deuces Live Festival Street" from 9th Ave S to 11th Ave S that raises the street and sidewalks to be flush with businesses, which would allow for the street to be turned into an outdoor gathering space for routine community events, pop-up commerce, and economic development.²

At the November 29, 2021, Committee of the Whole (COW) meeting, City Administration presented the proposed ARPA allocations. The discussions among members of the COW did indicate support for using ARPA funding for the "Deuces Live Festival Street". Based on these discussions, City Administration is requesting City Council reduce CRA funding for this project from \$1.5 million to \$300,000 in the "CRA Communications, Evaluations and Operations" budget and move \$1.2 million in funding to the "Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget. (The remaining \$300,000 for the project will be used to cover construction cost inflation and engineering design services.) This move will increase the CRA housing investment to \$3.05 million, which is 23.5% of the total budget. Table 1 below shows the changes to the two categories, while Tables 2 and 4 of Exhibit 1 in the resolution show the detailed changes made to the CRA budget.
