December 13, 2012 at 9:35 a.m.

PRESENT: Committee Members William Dudley, Chair; Leslie Curran, Vice Chair; Jeff Danner, Charlie Gerdes and Steve Kornell, Alternate.

ABSENT: None.

ALSO: Council Members James Kennedy, Karl Nurse and Wengay Newton; Mayor Bill Foster; City Administrator Tish Elston; Chief Assistant City Attorney Mark Winn; Planning & Economic Development Director Dave Goodwin; Zoning Official Philip Lazzara; Planner III Derek Kilborn; Primary Staff Support Special Projects Manager Evelyn Rosetti; Code Manager Secondary Staff Support Dave Dickerson, Rob Rowan resident and business owner; Hugh Tulloch, resident; John Mason, resident; Deputy City Clerk Amelia Preston and others.

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The meeting was called to order by Chair Dudley at 9:35 a.m. with the above members present.

In connection with the agenda for the December 13, 2012 meeting, Chair Dudley shared that item three will be addressed first. Committee Member Danner moved approval of the December 13, 2012 agenda as submitted. All were in favor of the motion. Absent. Curran. Kornell.

In connection with review of the draft minutes of the November 8, 2012 PSI Meeting, Committee Member Gerdes moved approval of the November 8, 2012 PSI Minutes as corrected. All were in favor of the motion. Absent. None. Chair Dudley informed the Committee that he had been approached by two individuals to provide input in today's discussion regarding Sidewalk Cafes that he would like to honor.

In connection with the continued/deferred business relating to Sidewalk Cafes, Zoning Official Philip Lazzara made a PowerPoint presentation on Sidewalk Café regulations which outlined outdoor uses generally on public right of way. He highlighted what Sidewalk Cafés started out to be, what they have become over the years and how very popular they are right now. He also provided information on the path of travel for pedestrians, that umbrellas have lights and can be permanently mounted to a foundation. He commented on buffers, referenced First Avenue North which has the capability to have the buffers installed and removed when they are not being used. His presentation provided information on the purpose and intent of regulation of existing as well as proposed changes being considered. Mr. Lazzara referenced the outdoor dining uses in right of way which is especially important and appropriate in the downtown locations; commented on the design criteria and stated that locations could be in all districts although are mostly in the downtown public right of way. Information was provided on the standards for pedestrian pathways, delineation of the perimeter, uniform design for furniture, and signage.

Comments were provided on the existing regulation of operations: criteria for permit/license requirement with an annual renewal, liability and insurance standards; maintenance and repairs; hours of operation; removal or relocation; suspension/revocation and an appeal process.

Mr. Lazzara commented on possible changes for consideration include: desire to change the design; distinguish between zoning districts; standards for being adjacent to residential when new residential moves in next to an existing café. It was shared that consideration of possible changes to design standards will include the following:

- Shade structures (umbrellas, awnings, tents)
- Delineation (landscape planters or railings)
- Appliances (fans, heaters, misters)
- Freestanding vs. attached
- Side walls and enclosures
- Overhead clearance and pathways
- Material placement and design
- Hours of operation
- Noise restrictions (amplified music)
- Standing vs. sitting areas

In summary Mr. Lazzara stated that the meeting was opened to questions/comments on existing regulations and uses, future meetings/process and stakeholders input.

Mr. Rob Rowan, 175 Second Street South, stated he has a business in St. Petersburg; commented on the amplified noise; stated the Supreme Court has not heard the case and it has been a year with no end in sight. He expressed concern regarding the late noise and stated that the residents downtown need help. Mr. Rowan commented that they believe that businesses and residence can co-exist and no one wants to close a business but late at night the noise is getting louder and louder. They are calling the police which is costing money to come out and the problem is not with the DJs, it's the business owners; and they don't want to wait until it's too bad. He stated that they were there first and they can't open their windows at night; stated Bayfront Tower's residents are concerned about the strobe lights, there is no security, and glass is on the sidewalks in the morning. Mr. Rowan stated further that his wife inquired why we can't just move because of the noise and loud music at night in the downtown; stated that they are looking for some answers and they are desperately in need of some help.

Mr. Hugh Tulloch, 555 5th Ave NE, Ste 921 Saint Petersburg, FL; stated that he supports Sidewalk Cafés, but they want to put a few reasonable restrictions on them; suggested it be unlawful to play amplified recorded or live music at anytime outside the abutting building.

Mr. Tulloch stated it shall be unlawful to permit amplified music from inside the abutting building to escape through any open door or windows and supports sidewalk cafés within 200 ft of residential uses; it should be unlawful to permit outside services earlier than 7:00 a.m. on any day and no later than 10:00 p.m. on Sunday through Thursday nights and no later than 11:00 p.m. on Friday and Saturday Nights.

Mr. John Mason, who lives in Bayfront Towers, thanked Council for being interested in the topic; stated that most of the residents really like sidewalk café but the issue is how to address the noise so hundreds of residents don't have to deal with the noise coming from the businesses with the outside amplified music.

Council Member Newton inquired about the tables that are adjacent to the street; cited the Garden Restaurant location as it related to tables being placed near the street closure on first Friday events. He inquired if the ropes that were being put up are without a permit. Chief Assistant City Attorney Mark Winn provided clarification as it related to insurance requirement and the City being liable. Council Member Newton suggested using the enclosures of the 8 ft. Committee Member Kornell commented on the visual hype of people screaming from the balconies; commented that everyone needs to be in the same room for this discussion so that everyone can provide input. He commented on the ability of having better communication to address this issue in the future.

Committee Member Gerdes inquired about the outdoor vs. inside noise. Attorney Winn stated that they can regulate each differently as it relate to amplified noise and they have the ability of requiring someone to close their windows and not have any outdoor noise by tenants/business owners. There was reference made to case law of noise as it relate to 10:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. Attorney Winn responded to what occurred and stated the Supreme Court has the ability to overturn or state what is sufficient. There was discussion regarding the regulation of plainly audible and the Supreme Court making their ruling.

Council Member Nurse commented that what is working is working very well. He commented briefly on the water meters and the issue with having them above ground. He also responded to the thriving downtown since the change to allow the serving of alcohol until 3:00 p.m.

Council Member Kennedy commented that he does agree with Nurse; they don't want to over regulate and they should hear from some people who operate sidewalk cafés. It was suggested that perhaps Sunday through Wednesday should be operated differently from the other days and suggested looking at the individual businesses and the owners. It was asked if it makes a difference as to who was there first. Attorney Winn shared that as long as they are regulated fairly it should not matter who came first. Committee Member Curran shared that it's the roof top issue that needs to be addressed now.

Philip Lazzara commented on the driving issue as it relate to sidewalk cafés are the individuals that keep changing the materials being used. It was shared that they can annually review and make sure that everything is being consistently administered. Committee Member Curran commented on adding additional furniture and paving. It was shared the planter designs should be done through design review according to the criteria that has been established. It was suggested that Staff do a complete review of roof top, and non-amplified outdoor noise.

Committee Member Gerdes inquired regarding how the individuals that are standing outside were being regulated since concerns have been expressed. Committee Member Gerdes made a motion to direct Administration to schedule two public forums and to invite the affected business owners to receive input on the potential changes to sidewalk cafés within the first 90 days of 2013. All were in favor of the motion. Absent. none.

Committee Member Kornell commented briefly regarding the standing law as it relates to bar owners with sidewalk cafés operating within the downtown area. He suggested that they all need to go out and see what the issue is; feels that they should regulate amplified noise other than talking and there needs to be fairness in the message. He also would like to do it the right way.

Council Member Newton inquired if the regulations would be citywide; expressed concern regarding the changes of outdoor furniture. He also commented on the individuals who are obstructing others from being mobile as well as those who are drinking and loudness of the individual.

Council Member Kennedy commented briefly that it's the noise not the regulation of the business that needs to be addressed. Mr. Lazzara commented on the sidewalk cafés and that the City requires the abutting property owner to maintain their property. Attorney Winn commented on the liability of the property owner and that if they are doing anything which would cause a hazard due to their business, they would be responsible. Council Member Kennedy inquired if the City would be responsible for fixing defects in the sidewalks. (Committee Member Danner was reported present at 10:36 a.m.)

Committee Member Curran commented briefly on things that the City would be responsible for relating to sidewalks prior to a business coming into play. Council Member Newton commented regarding situations as it relates to sidewalks that are not the responsibility of the City. There was general discussion regarding the way to address sidewalks that have not been maintained. Committee Member Gerdes asked for clarification as it relates to sidewalks and the maintaining of right of way adjacent to the owners property. It was asked for clarification as to what needs to occur at the two forums being proposed. Committee Chair Dudley suggested that staff make the same presentation and proposed changes to the business owners.

It was shared that the next meeting is scheduled for December 20, 2012. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:47 p.m.

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The meeting was called to order by Chair Dudley at 9:33 a.m. with the above members present.

In connection with the agenda for the December 20, 2012 meeting, Committee Member Gerdes moved with the second Committee Member Danner to approve the December 20, 2012 agenda as submitted. All were in favor of the motion. Absent. Curran.

It was shared that the PSI December 13, 2012 minutes were not ready for approval.

In connection with the agenda item relating to Hex Block Sidewalk, Urban Design & Development Coordinator Corey Malyszka provided a review of the submitted material commented on the property which is located at 235 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue North. He also provided a review of hexagon sidewalk policy and the changes that were made in 2004; commented that the applicant would like to replace the hex block due to poor conditions and is a safety issue. The applicant proposes to widen sidewalks up to 24 ft; excluding where the sidewalk intersects at grade tree planter. The existing sidewalk is approximately six feet wide and 92 ft. in length; however, the proposed sidewalks will range in size from seven (7) ft to 24 ft wide and the total length of sidewalk is 800 feet. Staff commented the issue of not having enough hexagon blocks to incorporate within the entire streetscape would create an inconsistent, aesthetically unappealing streetscape and would also not meet the intent of the policy, shared that the applicant has provide site plans, the first which illustrates the streetscape with the hexagon block to remain and the other without the hexagon block. It was revealed that this section of hexagon block sidewalk is not part of a continuous network of hexagon block sidewalks. It was highlighted that although this is a remnant section of hexagon block which abutted a single-family residence and a 19-unit assisted living facility; the neighborhood character has substantially changed with newer developments, such as the Huntington Townhomes, Baywalk, Synovus Bank and Hotel Indigo which are surrounding property have been improved with concrete sidewalks.

Staff support of the request is due to changes in the development pattern and character of the immediate area and recommends approval of the applicant's request since the City's Engineering Department has no objection to permitting the developer Mill Creek Residential Trust, LLC to remove the hexagon sidewalk from 2<sup>nd</sup> Street North right of way, subject to the following conditions:

1. The applicant shall return the remaining in-tact hexagon blocks to the city.
2. All necessary permits shall be acquired by the applicant prior to any work in the right-of-way.

Staff requests that the Public Services and Infrastructure Committee forward the request by the applicant to be heard before City Council.

Committee Member Danner inquired if the person who originally made the request was notified of this meeting. Staff response was no. It was asked that they be notified; commented on the policy as it relates to conflict and feels that it is something that should be addressed for future; suggested that consideration of some type of integration of using both. It was also suggested that St. Petersburg Preservation be notified.

Council Member Kennedy inquired about the resolution that was adopted in 2003 and asked for clarification of replacing the current hex block repair. Chief Assistant City Attorney Mark Winn commented that the resolution was to provide clarification and provide direction for staff who at the time would replace sidewalks. It was shared that yes and no the city would be responsible for repairing hexagon sidewalk. It was shared that the City would be responsible for the portion that is considered the city owned and the property owner is responsible for sidewalk up to the curb. There was discussion regarding the abutting property owner's responsibility of the sidewalk and the City's responsibility. Council Member Nurse commented on the historic district of hex block sidewalks; stated there are some sidewalks in need of repair along Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Street. He inquired who would be responsible for the replacement. Committee Member Curran commented that they are not sure if they are in the historic district so that is the reason they are here discussing this today because there are conflicting answers. Council Member Nurse inquired who would determine whether or not they are in the district. Mr. Winn commented that the historic districts are defined and each year the money is set aside in the Engineering Department's budget for replacement of sidewalks in the City.

Committee Member Gerdes shared that the applicant has indicated that they can't buy hex block and asked for a response. Corey Malyzska responded that they have the ability to purchase new hex block for sidewalks. Council Member Gerdes inquired if whether Mill Creek could incorporate having the hexagon design within the new concrete sidewalk. Sean Flannegan with Mills Creek commented that along 2<sup>nd</sup> Street they could have the pavers installed along the entrances to the building and using one of the patterns it would be appreciated. Committee Member Curran inquired if Hotel Indigo removed those in front of their building; feels that they need to get a better handle on what can be done. She commented when you have a district where there is sidewalk in need of repair; feels that the City should fix what they are responsible for.

Committee Member Danner commented briefly on the questions that are being asked and not being addressed. He expressed concern regarding the brick medians which are being installed which are extended too far into the roadway that you can't see until it's too late. Committee Member Danner moved to exempt the applicant from the policy requirement to replace the sidewalk with hexagon block, but that hex block is included in the design of the new sidewalk. All were in favor of the motion (Dudley, Curran, Gerdes, and Danner). It was also requested that a meeting be set up to address the policy city wide so that people will know what their responsibilities are as abutting property owners. It was suggested that the date be in January with nothing else on the agenda. Mayor Foster was reported present at 10:07 a.m.

In connection with the camera deployment locations (placement and use of CCTV/Video Cameras), Mike McDonald and Muslim Gadiwalla commented briefly on the proposed and pre-existing camera locations. He commented on what the cameras have been used for in the past; commented that the Police have utilized the cameras as appropriate by law; and that measures have been taken to protect personal privacy by law. Mr. McDonald reviewed the St. Petersburg Police Department General Orders which included the philosophy, purpose, definition, camera placement, monitoring, and programmed viewing patterns. It was shared that they obtained their information from Tampa which covered public spaces in public areas, sidewalks, alleys and public parking locations. Committee Member Gerdes inquired about Section 4-D which reflected that this policy does not apply to cameras used for investigative purposes by the Department or other law enforcement agencies. He also inquired about Section 6 – G relating to no recorded images shall be altered in any manner, unless exempted from disclosure in compliance with and required by Florida State Statute. Council Member Newton inquired about how many cameras are there currently. The response was there are currently six and the plan is to install a total of 21. Council Member Newton commented briefly on the reason for installing the additional cameras in public parks, tourist areas, and to assist with co-sponsored events and inquired if there has been an increase in crime or other problems as the reason for the installation of these additional cameras. Mr. McDonald responded that the direction is to place the additional cameras in those areas that have been identified. Chief Harmon responded that there is no reason to prohibit as long as the cameras are being used as safety in public spaces. Council Member Nurse asked if it would hurt to include them in hot spot areas. Mayor Foster commented that the word hot spot would need to coincide with public space. Chief Harmon commented that they would need to define what a hot spot is to avoid different interpretation. It was shared if they are talking about public streets; a hot spot can be defined as high degree of criminal activity because they are going to propose a location along 34<sup>th</sup> Street which is a hot spot that is strictly public. Mayor stated so that coincides with what we are talking about. Council Member Kennedy commented on the philosophy relating to privacy should also be included under Section D. Council Member Nurse commented on the need for critical response – not only the hot spots as being a high degree of criminal activity. Committee Member Kornell inquired if a public record request could be made where someone can purchase a video and asked would the individual have the ability to show it on U-tube. Chief Assistant City Attorney Winn responded to the legality of using something which has been videoed and used tickets at a game as an example. There was discussion regarding 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue North and Beach Drive.

Committee Member Curran inquired if there are currently cameras in the downtown along Beach Drive and the response was yes, but they are private and on private property. Mr. McDonald made referenced that existing camera locations included the following: Roof of the Mahaffey (1), Marina

(West Dock), Police Department Headquarter Building (1300 1<sup>st</sup> Avenue N. 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue & Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Street and the Sebring (State) Building (2) (2<sup>nd</sup> Ave & 5<sup>th</sup> St. N.) The locations for planned Camera Deployments will be at the following locations:

- # 1: 5th Ave & 15 St N
- # 2: 2nd Ave & 3rd St. So.
- # 3: 1st Ave & 3rd St. No.
- # 4: 1st Ave & 2nd St No.
- # 5: Central Ave & 4th St.
- # 6: Central Ave & 7th St.
- # 7: 2nd Ave N at Williams Park
- # 8: 2nd Ave & Beach Dr NE.
- # 9: 5th Ave & Beach Dr NE.
- #10: 7th Ave & Bayshore Dr NE.
- #11: Mid Core Parking Garage (North side, view of Sunshine Alley and Shops at St. Pete entrance)
- #12: Campbell Park Recreation Center
- #13: 7th Ave & 16th St. So.
- #14: 5th Ave & 34th St. No.
- #15: Burlington Ave and 34th St. No.

Administration shared that they will be coming to council for the proposed installation. Committee Member Curran inquired if there will be signage. It was asked if someone will be monitoring at all times and the response was no. It was stated that they will be recorded and perhaps will be reviewed. Chief Harmon commented that they will review data before an event so that if they need to have additional placement of officers, they can. Committee Member Curran also inquired if the cameras could be used at special events to perhaps offset the cost of the police officers and resources. She commented on the art event that was recently held and the ability to not have to use the number of officers that were utilized which would perhaps reduce the cost that would be associated. Chief Harmon commented that perhaps they will be able to cut down on some of the officers. It was shared that perhaps there could be some cost reduction. Committee Member Kornell asked how many cameras we have in the inventory, how many did we buy for the RNC. The response was there are six that are operational and 15 will be installed. Committee Member Danner inquired about the ability to get a court order about the monitoring or to utilize the video. There was discussion regarding the ability to zoom in on private property. It was suggested that signage be discussed further to perhaps address concerns that have been raised. Committee Chair Dudley thanked everyone and stated that he is going to expedite the scheduling of the other items that need to be addressed.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:42 a.m.
