

## Citizen Advisory Committee for the South St. Petersburg CRA

Prepared by the Economic and Workforce Development Department For Public Hearing and Executive Action at 5:00 pm on December 7, 2021

## Request

City Administration is requesting that the Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) for the South St. Petersburg Community Redevelopment Area recommend to the Community Redevelopment Agency that City Council approve the following amendments to the FY22 South St. Petersburg CRA budget:

- Reallocate \$1.2 million in CRA funding from the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget to the "CRA Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget;
- **2)** Maintain **\$300,000** in the "Deuces/WADA Improvements" line item of the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget;
- 3) Allocate **\$1.2 million** in the "CRA Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget to the following line items:

Property Acquisition and Site Preparation	\$600,000
Affordable Housing Redevelopment Loan Program	\$300,000
Affordable Residential Incentive Program	\$300,000

4) Allocate the estimated **\$13,009,038** in CRA revenue for use in the FY22 South St. Petersburg CRA Budget according to the following categories:

## Background on the South St. Petersburg CRA Budget Amendment

On November 9, 2021, City Council approved the estimated **\$13.01 million** FY22 South St. Petersburg CRA budget, which included a Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget of **\$1.850 million**, with the understanding that City Administration would be bringing back an amendment package to increase funding for affordable housing. The proposed amendment is designed to increase funding for affordable housing and concerns moving **\$1.2 million** of the **\$1.5 million** in funding from the "CRA Communications, Operations and Evaluation" budget to the "Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget. The funding will be pulled from the "Deuces/WADA Improvements" line item, which includes two parks located on 22<sup>nd</sup> Street South as well as the installation of a "festival" street from 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue South to 11<sup>th</sup> Avenue South. City Administration is proposing to use the City's share of funding from the American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) approved by Congress to pay for the festival street improvements. The remaining \$300,000 for the project in the "CRA Communications, Evaluation and Operations" budget will be used to cover construction cost inflation and engineering design services.

In summer 2021, the City received approximately \$45.4 million in ARPA funding. The City will receive two installments of \$22.71 million, the first disbursed in July with the second to be received in summer 2022. In late July, City Administration held three workshops to identify the priorities of City citizens from five broad categories. A total of 557 citizens ranked their priorities with "1" being the highest and "5" being the lowest. Below are the results calculated as a weighted average score.

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Based on this input, City Administration is recommending to City Council the following allocation of ARPA resources:

Under "Economic Recovery and Resiliency", City Administration is recommending four transportation and public-realm related projects with a total cost of **\$5,568,830**. This would include **\$1.6 million** for improvements to 22<sup>nd</sup> St S for the "Deuces Live Festival Street" from 9<sup>th</sup> Ave S to 11<sup>th</sup> Ave S that raises the street and sidewalks to be flush with businesses, which would allow for the street to be turned into an outdoor gathering space for routine community events, pop-up commerce, and economic development.<sup>2</sup>

At the November 29, 2021, Committee of the Whole (COW) meeting, City Administration presented the proposed ARPA allocations. The discussions among members of the COW did indicate support for using ARPA funding for the "Deuces Live Festival Street". Based on these discussions, City Administration is requesting City Council to reduce CRA funding for this project from **\$1.5 million** to **\$300,000** in the "CRA Communications, Evaluations and Operations" budget and move **\$1.2 million** in funding to the "Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization" budget. (The remaining \$300,000 for the project will be used to cover construction cost inflation and engineering design services.) This move will increase the CRA housing investment to **\$3.05 million**, which is 23.5% of the total budget. Table 1 below shows the changes to the two categories, while Tables 2 and 4 of Exhibit 1 in the resolution show the detailed changes made to the CRA budget.
