May 30, 2019

Present: Committee Chair Ed Montanari, Council Chair Charlie Gerdes, Brandi Gabbard, Lisa Wheeler-Bowman, Amy Foster, Deputy Mayor Kanika Tomalin, Government Affairs Director John Rodriguez, Kevin King, Jeff Sharkey, Office Systems Specialist Paul Traci, Assistant City Attorneys Jane Wallace and Heather Judd, Legislative Aide Justin Andrews

Chair Montanari announced the agenda order and introduced the legislative delegation in attendance. Representatives Diamond, Webb, and Newton were in attendance along with Senator Darryl Rouson. Chair Montanari asked staff and the delegation for a review of bills that passed and were pertinent to the City. Mr. John Rodriguez gave a summary of the 2019 legislative session and the administration's position on various topics. Mr. Rodriguez introduced Jeff Sharkey of Capitol Alliance group, who summarized each bill listed as a priority by the administration and the council during previous LAIR meetings. Mr. Sharkey then summarized preemption items and budget issues.

CM Gabbard, summarized growth management bill HB 7103 and asked about the effects it may have on linkage fees. Mr. Sharkey stated that that restriction was removed from an earlier version of the bill.

CM Gerdes asked if Mr. Sharkey maintained a running list of bills during sessions and if he could provide Council with weekly updates on active legislation. Mr. Sharkey gave an explanation of what Capitol Alliance does with tracking legislation and is willing to provide the city with any data that is requested, and Mr. Rodriguez reminded Council that the Florida League of Cities provides updates that he'd be willing to provide.

Committee Chair Montanari asked about HB5, and how it would affect a referendum such as "Penny for Pinellas." Mr. Sharkey stated that a referendum would have to be during a general election and end in a 2/3 majority. Chair Montanari turned the floor over to the Pinellas County Legislative Delegation.

Representative Webb thanked the committee for inviting her to speak and gave a brief overview of her experience during her first legislative session. Rep. Webb focused on short-term rental issue, sponsoring HB 1129. She also sponsored HB 4599 providing an appropriation for the Carter G Woodson museum, and HB 497 addressing Sanitary Sewer Laterals. She stated that the

City was very cooperative and helpful during the session citing a “team approach” to achieving stated goals.

CM Gabbard asked Rep. Webb to discuss her bill addressing Private Lateral connections in the sewer system. Rep. Webb summarized what the bill would have done if passed, including the publicizing of smoke test on Property Appraiser reports.

Senator Darryl Rouson discussed Medicare expansion, Sanctuary City legislation, and the Sadowski Fund. Sen. Rouson discussed his work on increasing funding for the arts, increasing grants from \$2million to over \$21million, and securing funding for the Carter G. Woodson. Sen. Rouson summarized his efforts with Senator Brandes on Criminal Justice reform, specifically driver license suspensions. Senator Rouson discussed his success with securing funding for programs addressing the opioid epidemic.

Rep. Newton gave a brief summary of his efforts during the 2019 session and reiterated his position that his work will continue to be centered around securing funding for the midtown area. Rep. Newton expressed that he felt left out of the City’s lobbying and “St. Pete Day” Activities attended by administration and various council members. Deputy Mayor Tomalin stated that the city was inclusive and worked with all elected officials to achieve goals that the city and Rep. Newton share.

Rep. Ben Diamond briefly discussed how the legislative process will continue to change as the area continues to grow and expressed his disapproval of preemption bills citing the diverse population that lives in St. Petersburg. Rep. Diamond discussed the USF Consolidation issue, and that USFSP Was solidified in state law as a satellite campus rather than an instructional site. Rep. Diamond finally gave his thoughts on the spending cut to Visit Pinellas.

Chair Montanari thanked the elected officials and Capitol Alliance Group for attending the LAIR meeting and proposed the next LAIR meeting to happen in mid to late July. CM Gabbard asked if a priority list could be made for federal legislative priorities and be discussed during the next meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:59 pm.

RESOLUTION OF THE ST. PETERSBURG CITY
COUNCIL SUPPORTING
THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF
TRANSPORTATION'S EFFORTS TO OBTAIN
FUNDING FOR THE RECONSTRUCTION OF
THE I-275/SR 60 INTERCHANGE IN THE
WESTSHORE AREA OF TAMPA EARLIER
THAN ANTICIPATED; REQUESTING
ADMINISTRATION TO CONTINUE WORKING
WITH THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF
TRANSPORTATION AND OTHER LOCAL
GOVERNMENTS AND TRANSPORTATION
AGENCIES IN THE TAMPA BAY REGION TO
OBTAIN THIS FUNDING; AND PROVIDING AN
EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the I-275/SR 60 interchange ("Westshore interchange") in the Westshore area of Tampa is a critical interchange in Florida's Strategic Intermodal System due to its central location in an urban core of the Tampa Bay region and its role as a gateway for residents and visitors traveling between Hillsborough and Pinellas Counties; and

WHEREAS, the Westshore District and Pinellas County's Gateway area at the western end of the Howard Frankland Bridge comprise one of the largest employment areas in the Southeast, serving a rapidly growing regional population of more than 2.5 million residents; and

WHEREAS, on an average day in 2017, over 168,000 motorists traveled on I-275 west of the Westshore interchange, and over 189,000 motorists traveled on I-275 east of the Westshore interchange; and

WHEREAS, a study conducted by FDOT in 2012 found that the longest bottleneck on Florida's Strategic Intermodal System in the entire state of Florida was on I-275 northbound from the Howard Frankland Bridge to Westshore Boulevard, resulting in traffic backups that can extend to the hump of the Howard Frankland Bridge or beyond; and

WHEREAS, this bottleneck creates a significant amount of delay in the schedules for the thousands of motorists on I-275 that travel through the Westshore interchange daily between home and work or other destinations; and

WHEREAS, Pinellas County residents traveling to the Tampa International Airport via I-275 are negatively impacted by the long backup to the flyover to Memorial Highway; and

WHEREAS, despite programmed construction projects on both sides of the Westshore interchange including the new span of the Howard Frankland Bridge, operational improvements in the Westshore Business District, and managed lanes, construction funding for the Westshore

interchange is not anticipated until the FY 2029 to FY 2045 period of the Long-Range Cost Feasible Plan for Florida's Strategic Intermodal System; and

WHEREAS, due to the delay in the funding for the Westshore interchange and projected traffic growth, traffic congestion will worsen to an even greater degree than exists today; and


WHEREAS, The Hillsborough County Commission, Pinellas County Commission, Tampa Bay Area Transportation Management Area Leadership Group and Forward Pinellas agree that the reconstruction of the Westshore interchange is the top transportation project priority for the Tampa Bay region.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of the City of St. Petersburg, Florida, that City Council supports the Florida Department of Transportation's efforts to obtain funding for the reconstruction of the I-275/SR 60 interchange in the Westshore area of Tampa earlier than anticipated.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that City Council requests Administration to continue working with the Florida Department of Transportation and other local governments and transportation agencies in the Tampa Bay region to obtain this funding.

This resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING SB 70 AND ANY OTHER PROPOSED LEGISLATION TO SAFEGUARD THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST FUND TO BE USED ONLY FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING; INSTRUCTING THE CITY CLERK TO TRANSMIT THIS RESOLUTION TO CERTAIN PERSONS AND ENTITIES; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Florida has the third highest homeless population in the nation, and 31 percent of all homeowners in Florida and 18 percent of all renters spend more than 50 percent of their income on housing; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of affordable housing is to increase the supply of safe, affordable housing for individuals and families with very low to moderate incomes; and

WHEREAS, Florida's affordable housing trust is funded by the Sadowski Act which established documentary stamp tax revenues as a funding source for Florida's affordable housing programs, including the State Apartment Incentive Loan (SAIL) program and the State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) program; and

WHEREAS, the Sadowski Act does not safeguard affordable housing trust dollars from being repurposed, making the fund a target for legislators looking to fund other items; and

WHEREAS, Section 215.32, *Fla. Stat.*, grants authority to the State Legislature to transfer unappropriated cash balances from state trust funds to either the General Revenue Fund or Budget Stabilization Fund; and

WHEREAS, since 2001, the State Legislature has transferred over \$2 billion from the affordable housing trust fund to the General Revenue Fund or Budget Stabilization Fund; and

WHEREAS, raiding the affordable housing trust fund year after year will diminish its effectiveness for years; and

WHEREAS, proposed legislation SB 70 has been filed for consideration during the 2019 session of the Florida Legislature and proposes to safeguard the affordable housing trust fund by restricting the use of the funds in the State Housing Trust Fund and the Local Government Housing Trust Fund; and

WHEREAS, proposed legislation SB 70 seeks to prevent sweeping Florida affordable housing trust dollars to fund unrelated budget items or deficits; and


WHEREAS, affordable housing trust funds are vital to the City of St. Petersburg in its comprehensive efforts to assist the citizens of St. Petersburg by increasing the supply of safe, affordable housing for individuals and families with very low to moderate incomes and in combatting homelessness.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of St. Petersburg, Florida that City Council urges the Florida Legislature to support SB 70 and any other proposed legislation which would safeguard the affordable housing trust fund to ensure that affordable housing funds are used only for affordable housing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Council hereby instructs the City Clerk to transmit a copy of this Resolution to the Senate President, the House Speaker and the Pinellas County Delegation.

This resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING MEASURES TO
PROVIDE ADDITIONAL PROTECTIONS FOR
ANIMALS; URGING THE PINELLAS COUNTY
COMMISSION TO AMEND THE PINELLAS
COUNTY CODE TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL
PROTECTIONS FOR ANIMALS; AND
PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Pinellas County Code § 14-31 entitled Unlawful Restraint of Dogs and Cats provides certain protections to dogs and cats that are tethered outside by requiring that the owner must be located outside with the tethered animal, the animal is not tethered outside during periods of extreme weather including extreme heat and thunderstorms, the animal tethered outside must be at least six (6) months of age, and the animal must not be sick or injured; and

WHEREAS, these same protections are not extended to dogs and cats that are kept outside in pens; and

WHEREAS, although a puppy could not be tethered outside, a puppy can be left outside in a pen all hours of day and night in extreme heat and thunderstorms so long as it has food, water and access to a doghouse shelter; and

WHEREAS, allowing a puppy or kitten less than six (6) months in age or a dog or cat that is sick or injured to be forced to live in an outdoor pen is cruel and unfair; and

WHEREAS, allowing a dog or cat to be forced to remain in an outdoor pen in all weather, including extreme heat and thunderstorms, is cruel and unfair; and

WHEREAS, the same protections that are made for dogs and cats who are forced to be tethered outside should be extended to dogs and cats that are forced to live in outdoor pens; and


WHEREAS, further protections should be given to dogs and cats to limit the amount of time that dogs and cats can be confined outside to two (2) to four (4) hours in a 24 hour period, and not between nighttime hours or during inclement weather.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of St. Petersburg, Florida that City Council requests that the Pinellas County Board of County Commissioners take prompt action to expand the protections to dogs and cats so penned animals have at least the same protections as tethered animals, and further, limit the amount of time that dogs and cats can be confined outside to two (2) to four (4) hours in a 24 hour period, and not between nighttime hours or during inclement weather.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that that this Council hereby instructs the City Clerk to transmit a copy of this Resolution to the Pinellas County Board of County Commissioners.

This resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING MEASURES
DURING AN EMERGENCY DUE TO A
FEDERAL GOVERNMENT SHUT-DOWN TO
CONTINUE REIMBURSEMENT FUNDING FOR
ESSENTIAL PUBLIC SERVICES PROVIDED
BY CERTAIN FEDERALLY FUNDED NOT-
FOR-PROFIT/GRANT SUB-RECIPIENTS; AND
PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, through the City of St. Petersburg Housing Department's consolidated planning process, the City has entered into agreements with certain not-for-profits/grant sub-recipients to reimburse expenditures incurred by those entities for providing essential public services to citizens of St. Petersburg; and

WHEREAS, for reimbursements made by the City pursuant to those agreements, the City then submits those expenditures on to the Federal Government for reimbursement of the City; and

WHEREAS, in case of an emergency due to a Federal Government shut-down, reimbursement of the City's portion of the funding of federally funded not-for-profits/grant sub-recipients which receive funding to provide essential public services (not including capital reimbursement) through the City of St. Petersburg Housing Department's consolidated planning process may be affected; and

WHEREAS, in continuing to make reimbursement of incurred expenses for essential public services under the normal agreement process during a Federal Government shut-down, the City may take on the risk of timing of the reimbursement or that reimbursement will not be made by the Federal Government; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the citizens of St. Petersburg that the City continue to honor the terms of those agreements by providing reimbursement of the incurred expenses for essential public services even though reimbursement by the Federal Government for those expenditures may be delayed or denied.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of St. Petersburg, Florida that City Council resolves that during a Federal Government shut-down, the City should continue to reimburse the City's portion of the funding of federally funded not-for-profits/grant sub-recipients which receive funding to provide essential public services (not including capital reimbursement) through the City of St. Petersburg Housing Department's consolidated planning process; and


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that that this Council authorizes advances from the General Fund to the appropriate grant fund to fund such payments, if applicable, and further

authorizes repayment of those advances back to the General Fund from the appropriate grant fund upon receipt of reimbursement from the Federal Government; and


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that that this Council directs the City in its annual update of the City's fiscal policies, to update those policies as needed to reflect this intent, and that any further compliance relating to budgetary requirements will be included in the annual budget cleanup process, as appropriate.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING AN UPDATE TO THE CITY OF ST. PETERSBURG VISION 2020 SPECIAL AREA PLAN, AND APPROVING TRANSMITTAL TO FORWARD PINELLAS FOR A CONSISTENCY REVIEW IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE COUNTYWIDE PLAN RULES; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, with significant public input and with an overriding theme of *Neighborhoods, Corridors and Centers*, St. Pete VISION 2020 was adopted by the City Council in October 2002;

WHEREAS, based upon the VISION 2020 document, the Comprehensive Plan was amended, the land development regulations re-written, and the entire City rezoned, all with an effective date of September 10, 2007;

WHEREAS, the Countywide Plan Rules mandated the preparation of a special area plan because the City was adopting the Planned Redevelopment-Residential, Planned Redevelopment-Mixed Use and Planned Redevelopment-Commercial Comprehensive Plan categories, as well as adopting a Workforce Housing Density Bonus Program, all of which permitted densities, floor-area-ratios or uses that surpassed what the Countywide Plan Rules allowed;

WHEREAS, St. Petersburg Vision 2020 Special Area Plan (SAP) was prepared in accordance with the Countywide Plan Rules and approved by City Council resolution in April 2007;

WHEREAS, changes and updates to the Vision 2020 SAP were approved by City Council resolution in 2008, 2010 and 2014, and forwarded in each instance to the Pinellas Planning Council (now known as Forward Pinellas) for consistency review with the Countywide Rules;

WHEREAS, a new update to the Vision 2020 SAP has been prepared by City staff, in part to implement housing initiatives, including increasing density in the Planned Redevelopment-Residential and Planned Redevelopment-Mixed Use categories, addressing accessory dwelling units, and increasing Workforce Housing Density Bonus; and

WHEREAS, the proposed changes to the Vision 2020 SAP, summarized in Exhibit A, were recommended for approval by the Community Planning & Preservation Commission on May 14, 2019.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of St. Petersburg, Florida:

That the St. Petersburg Vision 2020 Special Area Plan update, summarized in Exhibit A, be approved, and transmitted to Forward Pinellas for consistency review with the Countywide Plan Rules.

This Resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

WHEREAS, in 2017, more than 2.6 million people in Florida lacked health insurance at some point, and Florida had the fifth-highest rate of uninsured residents in the nation, with nearly 13% of the state's population uninsured; and

WHEREAS, nearly 30 million Americans continue to have no health insurance and another 40 million Americans remain underinsured since the implementation of the Affordable Care Act; and

WHEREAS, every person in the City of St. Petersburg deserves high quality health care; and

WHEREAS, the rising costs of health care have made it more difficult for the City's most vulnerable residents, including low income seniors, people with disabilities, veterans, families with children and those experiencing homelessness, and have added challenges to local government and to small businesses, which keep our communities thriving; and

WHEREAS, the Medicare for All Act of 2019 would provide national health insurance for every person in the United States for all necessary medical care including prescription drugs, hospital services, surgical services, primary care, preventative care, emergency services, reproductive care, dental care, vision care and long-term care; and

WHEREAS, the Medicare for All Act of 2019 would provide coverage without copays, deductibles or other out-of-pocket costs, and would slash the costs of administration, protect the doctor-patient relationship and assure patients a free choice of doctors; and



WHEREAS, the City of St. Petersburg is one of the most diverse cities in the country with a large Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer/Questioning (LGBTQ) community; and

WHEREAS, ensuring the success of our small business community in the City of St. Petersburg is vital to our growth and improvement of the quality of life for our residents; and

WHEREAS, the City of St. Petersburg is committed to providing all business owners, including historically underrepresented business owners, with equal opportunities to compete and succeed, and is committed to increasing the number and diversity of supplier options; and

WHEREAS, the City of St. Petersburg provides inclusionary measures for small business entities through the Small Business Enterprise (SBE) program; and

WHEREAS, the City of St. Petersburg adheres to non-discrimination and equal employment opportunity policies that includes LGBTQ individuals with regards to hiring practices; and

WHEREAS, the City is seeking to better understand the LGBTQ business community by recognizing these businesses and by monitoring usage of LGBTQ owned businesses in the procurement of goods and services.


NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of St. Petersburg, Florida, with full support of Mayor Rick Kriseman and his administration:

WHEREAS, affordable housing is vital to the City of St. Petersburg in its comprehensive efforts to assist the citizens of St. Petersburg by increasing the supply of safe, affordable housing for individuals and families with very low to moderate incomes and in combatting homelessness; and

WHEREAS, HUD is charged with administering Section 8 housing funding which authorizes payment of rental housing assistance to private landlords to provide affordable housing for individuals and families with very low incomes; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of Section 8 housing is to assist in providing safe, affordable housing; and

WHEREAS, presently, federal laws are not enforced stringently so that properties in dilapidated conditions pass inspection, and when properties fail inspections, many residents are sometimes left months without any action taken to upgrade or improve living conditions; and

WHEREAS, on April 11, 2019, Senator Marco Rubio introduced SB 1184 the HUD Inspection Act of 2019 in the United States Senate; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Charlie Crist has joined as a co-sponsor of the HUD Inspection Act of 2019 which has now been introduced in the United States House of Representatives; and

WHEREAS, the HUD Inspection Act of 2019 proposes to increase transparency in the inspection process and strengthen enforcement actions against property owners who fail to maintain their properties; and


WHEREAS, the HUD Inspection Act of 2019 would provide more accountability by forcing HUD to take greater action when federally assisted housing projects fail to come into compliance with federal housing laws.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of St. Petersburg, Florida that City Council urges the support of the HUD Inspection Act of 2019, SB 1184 and any other proposed legislation which would support safe and affordable housing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Council hereby instructs the City Clerk to transmit a copy of this Resolution to Congressman Charlie Crist, Senator Marco Rubio, Senator Rick Scott, and the Pinellas County Delegation.

A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT; URGING THE FEDERAL DELEGATION TO SUPPORT THE EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT AND TO ENACT IMPLEMENTING LEGISLATION FOR THE EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT; URGING THE GOVERNOR OF FLORIDA AND THE FLORIDA LEGISLATURE TO TAKE THE NECESSARY STEPS FOR RATIFICATION OF THE EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the U.S. Constitution does not currently guarantee women the same rights and protections as men; and

WHEREAS, in order to amend the Constitution, an amendment must be passed by Congress and then ratified by three-fourths of the states; and

WHEREAS, although women did not have the right to vote before 1919, the 19th Constitutional amendment was passed by Congress in 1919 giving women the right to vote, and was then ratified by three-fourths of the states in 1920; and

WHEREAS, each year beginning in 1923, the Equal Rights Amendment was introduced as a bill in Congress and read "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex"; and

WHEREAS, Congress finally passed the Equal Rights Amendment in 1972 but then limited the time for ratification by the necessary 38 states to seven (7) years; and

WHEREAS, the Equal Rights Amendment was quickly ratified by 30 states by 1973 but then the ratification process slowed as opposition grew; and

WHEREAS, by 1979, which was the seven (7) year deadline, only 35 states had ratified the Equal Rights Amendment; and

WHEREAS, since 1979, two (2) more states have ratified the Equal Rights Amendment, but the 37 states still fall just one state short of the 38 states which must ratify the Equal Rights Amendment; and

WHEREAS, at this time which is almost 100 years after women getting the right to vote, women have the vote but still lack equality under the Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the Equal Rights Amendment would guarantee under the Constitution that all people are equal and these rights cannot be altered; and

WHEREAS, Congress can and should amend the language to remove the deadline for ratification, and S.J. Resolution 6 has been introduced to remove the deadline for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment and allow for its ratification once the 38th state votes to ratify; and

WHEREAS, only one more state is needed to achieve the 38 state threshold to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment.


NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of St. Petersburg, Florida that City Council supports the Equal Rights Amendment and requests that the Federal Delegation strongly urge the United States Congress to make a deliberate and thorough effort to support S.J. Resolution 6 to remove the deadline for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment and allow for its ratification once the 38th state votes to ratify.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that that this Council supports the State of Florida becoming the 38th state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment and requests that the Local Delegation strongly urge the Governor of Florida and the state legislature to take the necessary steps for the State of Florida to become the 38th state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that that this Council hereby instructs the City Clerk to transmit a copy of this Resolution to the Federal Delegation, the Local Delegation and the Governor of the State of Florida.



AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

WHEREAS, the burning of fossil fuels creates greenhouse gas emissions which cause the continued warming of the atmosphere leading to an increase in heat waves, air pollution, and flooding incidents; and

WHEREAS, rising temperatures result in threats to the infrastructure and private property in the City of St. Petersburg (the "City"), and the disruption of environmental, social, and economic systems due to climate change will increase the vulnerability of residents; and

WHEREAS, St. Petersburg's City Council exists to enhance the health, safety, and quality of life for all residents, and the City has endeavored to be a good steward of the State and region's environment and its resources; and

WHEREAS, St. Petersburg's City Council has enacted and supported legislation to address climate change, affordable housing, protection of the environment, job growth, living wages, and justice and equity for all people; and

WHEREAS, St. Petersburg's City Council is working with public, industry and independent sector partners and with citizens to address sustainability and community resiliency and has invested significant public monies to improve infrastructure, sustainability and resiliency, and to protect the environment; and

WHEREAS, the City is the first city in Florida and the 20th in the country to commit to transitioning to 100% clean, renewable energy; and

WHEREAS, on February 7, 2019, members of Congress proposed House Resolution 109 and Senate Resolution 59, collectively known as the "Green New Deal"; and

WHEREAS, the Green New Deal seeks:

- (1) to achieve net-zero greenhouse gas emissions through a fair and just transition for all communities and workers;**
- (2) to create millions of good high-wage jobs and ensure prosperity and economic security for all people of the United States;**

- (3) to invest in the infrastructure and industry of the United States to sustainably meet the challenges of the 21st century;
- (4) to secure for all people of the United States for generations to come clean air and water, climate and community resiliency, healthy food, access to nature and a sustainable environment; and
- (5) to promote justice and equity by stopping current, preventing future, and repairing historic oppression of indigenous peoples, communities of color, migrant communities, deindustrialized communities, depopulated rural communities, the poor, low-income workers, women, the elderly, the unhoused, people with disabilities, and youth; and


